Protection of Plant Varieties and Farmers' Rights Authority (PPVFRA), GoI, New Delhi, in joint collaboration with New Zealand High Commission, New Delhi organised a Sensitization Programme for Fruit Growers of New Zealand on 4th July, 2024, at the Plant Authority Bhawan, New Delhi. The programme aimed to apprise the Fruit Growers of New Zealand of processes of plant variety registration and quarantine clearance in India. A total of 21 online participants including 9 participants from



New Zealand attended the meeting that was organised in hybrid mode. The participants from New Zealand included officials of

governmental agencies, private fruit grower and exporter companies and their association officials. The said meeting was the result of an understanding in between PPVFRA and NZ High Commission

to facilitate the protection of foreign plant varieties in India so that the Indian farmers get an enhanced access to quality planting material of new improved varieties developed in New Zealand.

Dr. Trilochan Mohaptra, presided over the said sensitization programme. New Zealand High Commission was represented by Ms. Melanie Philips, Regional Agriculture Counsellor and Ms. Neera Arora, Head, Business Development. From Indian Side, a number of senior officials from various government agencies and departments and ICAR were present in the said workshop. These included Dr. Dinesh K. Chairperson, PPVFRA in his remarks further expressed the hope that such sensitization programme would play a key role in facilitating more and more plant registration of plant varieties from foreign countries.
